

SUBMISSION GUIDE

Submitted materials should meet the following criteria:

- Contains goals/objectives
- Contains speaker's notes (if a PowerPoint presentation)
- Created within the last 5 years OR has historical value OR contains content that is still relevant and not outdated
- Content focuses on elder abuse or a related topic
- Material is accurate, current, practical, coherent and understandable to the intended audience member
- Contains references/ citations for non-original material
- DOES NOT: reduce or minimize victim safety; encourage silo thinking (working alone and not collaborating); or promote ageism or negative images of older victims or adults

*Please note that not all submissions may meet criteria for inclusion on the website. The primary purpose of submitted materials should be for training endeavors, not for promotion.

TOPIC CATEGORIES	Possible Topics & Related Terms
CAREGIVING	Stress management, communication, problem-solving, barriers, frustration, resources, coping skills, self-care, physical caregiving
COGNITION / CAPACITY	Brain health, capacity, dementia, cognitive impairment, Alzheimer's disease, decision-making, behavioral issues, informed consent, guardianship
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN LATER LIFE	intimate partner violence, abuse in later life
EMOTIONAL / PSYCHOLOGICAL ABUSE	verbal, gas lighting, emotional distress, coercion, undue influence
FINANCIAL ABUSE	Financial exploitation, identity theft, scams, investment fraud, banking, powers of attorney, fiduciary, capacity
GUARDIANSHIP / CONSERVATORSHIP	Guardianship and alternatives to guardianship, decision-making options, supported decision-making
LEGAL	Regulations, code sections, prosecuting, civil, criminal, penalties, undue influence, guardianship
LONG-TERM CARE	Residential care facility, continuing care retirement community, board and care, assisted living, skilled nursing facility (SNF) / nursing home, continuity of care, PACE
MANDATORY REPORTING	Adult Protective Services (APS), mandated reporters, ombudsman, law enforcement, banking industry
MULTIDISCIPLINARY TEAMS	Collaboration, team, coalition, coordination
NEGLECT	Adult Protective Services (APS), dehydration, malnourishment, starvation, pressure ulcers, unsanitary conditions, forensic markers
OVERVIEW/GENERAL	Range of topics covered, might include: definition, causes, types/forms, signs, symptoms, risk factors, responding, reporting, documentation, prosecution, aging (normal vs. forensic markers), ageism (stereotypes, myths, discrimination), incidence and prevalence
PHYSICAL ABUSE	Bruising, bodily injury, forensic markers
PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE	Disaster-related fraud, waste, or abuse, pandemics, emergencies
PREVENTION / INTERVENTION	Preventing elder abuse, neglect, and exploitation
PUBLIC AWARENESS	Elder abuse messaging, increasing public awareness
SCREENING / ASSESSMENT	Interview, history
SELF-NEGLECT	Adult Protective Services (APS), hoarding, dehydration, malnourishment, unsanitary conditions, capacity
SEXUAL ABUSE	Predator, rape, abuser registry

SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER	Substance use disorder

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INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS

TYPE	DEFINITION
CASE STUDY	A situation in real life that can be looked at or studied to learn about something
CURRICULUM	Plan incorporating a series of intended learning outcomes and experiences. Should include teaching objectives, lesson plan, and instructional materials, e.g., lecture slides, case studies, handouts, videos, etc.
E-LEARNING COURSE	Course conducted via electronic media, typically on the Internet
EVALUATION / ASSESSMENT	Objective or subjective procedures used to measure objectives, standards, or criteria, e.g., pre- and post-tests, questionnaires, performance-based assessments
LECTURE	Information presented orally to a group of learners. Elements: slides (e.g., PowerPoint), speaker's notes, references
PODCAST	A program (as of music or talk) made available in digital format for automatic download over the Internet
VIDEO	Video to support training, e.g., lectures, case examples, etc. May include a discussion guide.
WEBINAR	A live online educational presentation during which participating viewers can submit questions and comments
